

Utilise the Falls Agenda for Opportunity

- Highly recognised factor for Health Housing
- Picks up nicely some recommendations in WAO report
- Provides a useful measure for wellbeing
- Queensland (Australia) study evidences reduction in falls from public health measures focussing on 'having the conversation' routinely and myth-busting 'falls as inevitable consequence of ageing'

National Falls Taskforce

- Focus on primary falls prevention
- Helping provide consistent messaging throughout organisations and communities
- A compact with older people around responsibilities for health needs
- Representatives from public/third sectors
- Merging of three strategic agendas:




The 4 principles of prudent healthcare



National Taskforce Achievements

- Pulling together a multi-agency, multi-disciplinary body around a common agenda and with one voice
- Incorporating all 7 Health Boards, Local Government, Community Partners, Third Sector and Older People
- Developing significant products, e.g. FBI Training, Fuel Tank from 3 strategic pillars of SoSS
- Develop evidence-based strategies and information hosted by Ageing Well in Wales website
- ✓ Basis for a 'National Conversation' relevant to NHS, Care, Community Pharmacy, Third Sector, etc.

Steady On... Stay SAFE

Falls are not an inevitable part of growing older.

Reduce your risk of falls:

- FALLS HISTORY If you fall, tell someone and reflect on why, where and how
- STRENGTH & BALANCE Stay active and stay strong
- SAFE HOMES -Watch your step and be aware of trip hazards

- Strength & Balance Promoting activity through NERS and Third Sector providers
- Home Safety link Local Govt., FRS, Care & Repair, in making vulnerable households safe

Making it Happen

- Developing a regional taskforce in all 7 Health Boards, linked to the National Taskforce (NHS + Community)
- Deliver our Falls Brief Intervention Training (FBIt) to all key partner organisations, promoting a falls MECC approach
- Seek out regional FBIt 'champions' in each region that would cascade training to priority sectors including their own (in turn seeking more champions)
- Delivering brief intervention conversations and recording numbers for 6 months to gather evidence
- Moving from a *campaign* to a sustainable *public* service approach

Housing EHPs role in Falls Prevention?

- This is our 'bread and butter'
- Housing reps on regional (and local) FP Taskforce
- Find out who is leading on this agenda in your area
- Becoming FBiT champions and/or delivering brief intervention conversations.

Housing Health Cost Calculator (HHCC)

- Calculates the health costs of hazards in the home, and savings made when these have been mitigated/removed
- Developed by BRE in partnership with RHE (<u>www.housinghealthcosts.org</u>)
 Case Study 1:
- HHSRS Category 1 hazard for falls associated with steps
- Cost of the actual works = £1,416.
- The cost saving to the NHS = £545.
- Cost saving to society = £1,363.
- Payback period of less than 1 month.





Case Study 2 (HHCC)

- HHSRS assessment Category 1 Hazards Excess Cold, Food Safety, Personal hygiene, Sanitation and Drainage, Falling on Stairs, Flames, hot Surfaces etc. (Fire)
- Cost of works = £14,073.88
- Cost saving to the NHS = £18,059 per year.
- Cost saving to society = £45,147.50
- Payback period = 9 months.
- Partnership solution Fire Service, Social Services, third sector agency (benevolent funding)









Looking Ahead...

- 1. Be part of the solution by making housing services relevant:
 - Falls prevention
 - Delayed transfers of care
 - Maintaining independence
 - Planning for older age
- 2. Making the connections between our services, providing mutual support
 - GPs, social workers, integrated H&SC teams, third sector
