

EU Transition and Beyond

Transition period will end on the 31st December 2020

- So what does this mean for food safety in the UK?
- The European Union (Withdrawal) Act of 2018
 permits certain EU laws to be directly transferred into UK law effective Jan. 1, 2021.
- Example EC Reg 178/2002 General Food Law will be transposed into UK law through The General Food
- Law (Amendment etc.) (EU Exit) Regulations 2019.
- Authorisation
- Official Controls and Enforcement
- FSA Role





Food Trade

- Trade negotiations may not appear to have an immediate impact on your work in food safety
- No trade agreements as yet
 - UK-US trade negotiations started on 5th May 2020
 - UK- Japan trade objectives were set on the 13th May 2020
 - Australia and New Zealand are underway
- Implementation of Northern Ireland Protocol!
- Negotiations impacted on by Covid 19 and FSA indicate that delivery increasingly challenging.
- Issues of concern for public health and animal welfare –
 hormone treated beef; Ractopamine feed additive to promote
 growth in pigs; BST lactation promoting hormone used to increase
 milk yields in cows; 'chlorine washed chicken'; antibiotics; labelling;
 battery cages; narrow pig stalls
- Export Certificates



Food Labelling – Allergens & PPDS

- Pre-packed for direct sale (PPDS)
- At present food businesses can provide mandatory allergen information for PPDS products by any means they choose, including orally by a member of staff.
- Food Information (Amendment) (England) Regulations (FIR 2019), which will come into force on 1 October 2021..
- Will require the packaging or labels of PPDS foods sold in England to display the following information clearly:
 - name of the food;
 - o full ingredients list; with
 - allergenic ingredients emphasised for example, in bold, italics or a different colour.
- The requirements in respect of other non-prepacked foods are unaffected by the changes.
